

- ▶ Participation of Societal Stakeholders and SMEs in European standardization, complementing their participation at national level → Specific partnerships with CEN and CENELEC

The Opinion mechanism



In addition to commenting, Societal Annex III

- A Right to submit an Opinion at:
 - ▲ Enquiry
 - ▲ Formal Vote
- Opinion is expected to be:
 - Used positively
 - Used when actively participating
 - ▲ Constructive for TC to take on board
- Opinion is not part of the ballot:
 - Outcome vote: not affected
 - ▲ National delegation principle: **not** affected

CEN-CENELEC PPE Sector Forum

- ▶SBS expert chaired Topic Group on Sustainability until May 2022
- ►SBS currently working on proposal for eco-design standard for PPE garments


CEN/TC 207(Furniture) - prEN 17869 testing of connectors for furniture

- ▶input from SBS expert led to inclusion in the standard of a reference connector and not only the testing procedure.
- ►SMEs cannot test furniture connectors themselves, they rely on information given by hardware suppliers
- ► Need for reliable reference data for different connectors to improve their furniture design


Content of CEN-CENELEC Guide 17



► Guidance to writers of standards on relevant issues to consider when drafting standards to avoid exclusion of SMEs from the market and distortion of fair competition.

► The guide is relevant to all involved in **WGs**, **TCs & national** (mirror) committees.

► Issues to consider during: preparation of NWI, preparation and development of a standard, structure and presentation of content,...

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SME Compatibility test - Objectives





Provide an overall perception of the SME compatibility of any given standard



Based on CEN-CENELEC Guide 17



Rank into broad categories (good, average and poor standards)



Starting point for possible improvement of standards



To be updated in line with users' experiences



SME Compatibility test – Composition & use

- ► Intended for people with some experience in standardisation & the subject area
- ► Can be applied at any stage of development: Enquiry, Formal vote, finalised standards and on any standard
- ▶ Online form with questions calculating overall score
 - ▶ 11 criteria and 21 questions
 - Related to text of standard & impact/ implementation
- ► Scores: 1,3,5, N/A (non-applicable)
- ▶ Different weight of different criteria

	TERION 1: JUSTIFICATION, TARGET GROUP AND RELATION WITH HER STANDARDS
	iterion looks at drafting which leads to possible misunderstandings or unclarity regarding the purpose of the standard, target audience or n to other standards. SMEs are not always aware of which standards apply to their businesses.
	ndards users, especially SMEs it is important to get clear and accurate information about the intended use of the standard, changes made editions of standards and their relations with other documents.
introdu	important to judge the relevance of a standard or how changes in a new edition may affect them. This information is often provided in the action and foreword of the standard (CEN and CENELEC) or an informative Annex (ETSI). In any case this information should be easily iible and available to all potential users of the standard.
1.1 A	re relations to other standards and main changes to previous editions appropriately indicated?
0	Score 1 - There is important information missing. For example the most important changes to the previous edition (in the case of revisions of existing standards) are not listed or relevant information on the relation with other standards is not included i.e. whether the standard replaces another document completely or in part or whether it is intended to be used with another standard.
0	Score 3 - There is some information, but the information is incomplete or not clear.
0	Score 5 - The information is correct, complete, and clear.

SME Compatibility test - Result





0 - 33%

The standard is poor & causes substantial challenges for SMEs. It requires urgent/fundamental improvement.



34 - 66%

The standard is average in relation to compatibility with SME's needs. It should be improved.



67 - 100%

The standard is good & compatible with SMEs' needs in general. It requires little or no change





- ▶ 4 "Annex III organizations" representing SMEs and Societal Stakeholders in the European Standardization system (ANEC, ECOS, ETUC, SBS)
- Same rights as CEN & CENELEC European Partners (Guide 25), and more...
 - e.g. **Right to comment** at ENQ <u>and</u> FV
 - e.g. **Right of opinion** (for Societal stakeholders)
 - **▶ Same rights than other experts** in **WGs**
- ► Inclusiveness, transparency & openness of the system makes better standards
